Laying the Foundation-Stone of the
Church of Seagoe Church

On Friday, 11th April, 1890, the ceremony of laying the Foundation-Stone of the Church of Seagoe Parish Church was performed by Mr. Berwick Van Stieglitz, of Carrickblacker. This is an important and portentous extension and improvement of the Church which is now being carried out by Messrs. Collier Bros., of Portadown, in accordance with the plans of Thomas Drew Esq. R. A. A., Architect. Besides this Church (which includes also an Organ-chamber and Vestry), Mr. Drew's plans provide for a South Aisle, which will accommodate 200 persons; a new roof, of great beauty of design, for the Nave; new side doors corresponding with ornate character of the new work; and the conversion of the present Vestry-room into a spacious and handsome Porch. The entire expenditure covered by the contracts is £2,832.

The day was unusually propitious. It was one of the finest of the season, bright and warm. Great interest in the proceedings was felt both by the parishioners and by their neighbours in Portadown and the adjoining parishes. At 3 o'clock P.M., when the Service began, above 400 persons were assembled, among whom were the following:-

With the sanction of the Bishop a Special
 Order of Service had been arranged and printed
 by Rev. A. Dawson, by whom a ^{handwritten} copy
 bound -ed by the Service book, suitably
 lettered, was presented to the Baronets Von
 Stegitz. The Trowel presented ther by the Con-
 tractors was supplied by the well-known house
 of Messrs. W. Gibson & Co., Belfast. It is of solid
 Silver, elaborately wrought, with carved ivory

handle, and is quite a work of art. It has two inscriptions; that on the front is as follows:-
 "Presented to the Baroness Van Culin by her
 son-in-law, Mr. Alexander Comickblacker,
 on her laying the Foundation-
 stone of the Church of St. George Blundell,
 April 11th 1890; by Messrs. Collett Bros.
 Contractors, Matlock." On the reverse is
 inscribed - "This Church is built in
 memory of Stewart Blacker, D.L. & J.P.,
 Comickblacker."

About half-past 2 o'clock the Bishop and Clergy began to assemble in the Parochial School house, when they robed, and whence they went in procession to the site. When the procession was within the church-gate, the 84th Psalm ("O how amiable are thy dwellings, thou God of Hosts"), was repeated by the Bishop and Clergy ~~successively~~ responsively. Inside the church, Hymn 42 ("We love thy King, Lord") was given out by Rev. R. Quirk, Curate, and sung by the Choir and congregation. The first part of the Special Service was then said by Rev. A. Dawson, Rectr. Then was sung Hymn 418 ("This stone in faith, to
 Thee we lay").

Rev. A. Dawson then mentioned that the casket jar, which would be placed beneath the foundation-stone, contained the following papers:-

5. Second list of subscribers, Nov. 25, 1889.
6. Handbill commanding the proposed laying of the foundation-stone.
7. Form of Service used on the occasion.
8. Copy of the Portadown and Tiverton News, of Saturday April 5, 1890, containing an article on the History of Leagoe Church, and the details of the enlargement of the same.
9. Document engraved on parchment recording the laying of the foundation-stone of church. This is as follows:-

"This Document records, That on Friday, April 11, 1890, the foundation-stone of the church of Leagoe Parish Church, which is now being enlarged, was laid by the Baroness Van Stieglitz, of Carrickblacker; at whose sole charge the church is being built, in loving memory of her brother, the late Stewart Blacker, D.L. and J.P., of Carrickblacker; by whose munificence and pious care the Endowment Fund of the Parish was formed in 1876, in addition to many other parochial benefactions.

The Rev. A. Dawson, on behalf of the parishioners and subscribers, then asked the Baronet to lay the foundation-stone. Mr. John Collen, the senior member of the firm of contractors, presented her with the silver maul for the ceremony.

The Rev. A. Dawson deposited the glass jar containing the documents & papers above specified, in the cavity made for it in the concrete course at the North-east corner of the Chapel, adjoining the bethel. The bed of the stone to be laid above it was then prepared and the stone - a block of red Dumfries Sand-stone 2.6 square, 9" - was lowered to its place, and squared and levelled by Mr. Drew, assisted by the ^{John & Joseph} Collens. Mr. Drew having certified to the Baronet Van Straight that the stone was well and truly laid, he then, touching the stone, repeated with deep emotion, the appointed form:-

"To the glory of God, and in loving memory of Stewart Blacker, we place this foundation-stone; in the faith of Jesus Christ, and in the Name of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Amen"

Archbishop Bishop addded the assembly.
Hymn 419 ("Christ is our Corner-stone") was
sung, and the concluding part of the Service
was said by Rev. A. Dawson. The Benedic-
tion was pronounced by the Lord Bishop.

The musical portion of the Service was
conducted, with great ability, by Mr. Char-
les Wilson, of Dumbarton (the organist), assisted by
Rev. Mrs. Hen. Wilson, and the parochial
Choir.

The flags of L.O.D. Nos. 26, and 41 (Bannock-
burn), in the charge of their respective
Masters, Captn. Richard Atkinson and
John Montgomery, graced the scene, and
gave a fitting tribute of respect to the memory
of one of the most honoured Clerks and
devoted friends of the Breage Institution.

Besides this, (which includes also
an Organ-chamber and Vestry), Mr. Drew's
